



Best Practices Scholarship Program

The Best Practices Scholarship Program provides the opportunity for two days of in-person comprehensive training and consultation at the University of Vermont with Center on Rural Addiction (UVM CORA) faculty and staff experts. The Program is intended for teams of up to four individuals from practices in rural counties in Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, and New York who are hoping to

- Learn how to better support patients in rural areas with complex needs related to substance use disorders (SUD) including opioid use disorder (OUD)
- Receive extensive training on topics related to OUD/SUD with a specific focus on evidence-based best practices and how to enhance prevention and treatment in rural communities, and
- Explore issues or challenges occurring within their own practice with other experts in the field and gain the skills and resources necessary to make improvements.

Our Approach

One of the unique features of the UVM CORA Best Practices Scholarship Program is that instead of providing specialized training to a single provider, the program provides a **team-focused** approach where multiple staff from a practice are invited to learn together as well as explore their own needs and issues. The goal is to support the practice in creating sustainable, collaborative, continuous improvement and enhance implementation of evidence-based strategies intended to better serve individuals with OUD/SUD in their rural communities.

The **two-day program agenda** is completely customizable and determined by the needs of the practice. Core sessions (see next page) are integrated into the agenda across the two days but meant to be adapted based on the interests and experience of applicants. Optional sessions can also be selected when applying and customized ahead of the program. As part of the sessions or in separate consultations, participants also have the opportunity to bring challenging clinical cases or logistical difficulties from their practice to discuss with the UVM CORA team. Depending on the topic, shadowing faculty or other staff in different clinic settings is also possible. Practices selected for the program will have a planning meeting with UVM CORA faculty before the program to discuss experiences associated with core or optional sessions and to customize the two-day program agenda to best suit interests and needs.

Upon completion of the program, **ongoing follow-up and support** from UVM CORA is provided via e-mail, phone, video-conferencing, and site visits, where UVM CORA faculty can visit the practice to see how things are going and provide additional training around evidence-based best practices.

Financial Support

Travel, room and board, and continuing education credits (being applied for now) are covered by UVM CORA for up to four participants per practice awarded a scholarship to the program. Additionally, UVM CORA will provide resources to account for time spent away from the office. Our aim in covering all costs is to better support rural practices who may not be able to afford high training expenses or lost work hours.

In the situation that a rural practice team cannot travel to Burlington, VT for the program, UVM CORA is able to provide the two-days of learning on-site at the practice or another preferred location. This is determined on a case-by-case basis and may limit some of the offerings of the program (ex: shadowing).

Application Process

Only one application is needed per practice. Applicants should be prepared to include the names and credentials of all staff participating, indicate where specialized training is needed, and share other areas of interest or specific issues and needs. Describing unique challenges or concentrations will help the UVM CORA faculty to customize the program in a manner best suited for the practice.

Deadline is **November 15, 2021**. Following the close of the application period, UVM CORA faculty will review and respond by mid-December. Program dates are scheduled about 2-3 months following the application in coordination with the practice to ensure adequate time for travel arrangements. For the 2022 program, this means that applicants will be notified by mid-December, and the program will take place in the first quarter of 2022, pending availability of the participants and UVM CORA faculty and staff.

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FAQs

Q. Who can apply?

A. Teams of up to four individuals from rural practices in Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, or New York. To confirm that your practice is defined as Rural by HRSA, please check eligibility at <https://data.hrsa.gov/tools/rural-health>.

Q. When will applicants be notified?

A. By mid-December, 2021.

Q. When and where will the training take place?

A. The goal is for in person training to take place at UVM CORA (Burlington, Vermont) in the first quarter of 2022 (January – March). In the event that travel or in-person meeting is not possible, alternative training will be scheduled.

Q. What areas will the training cover?

A. Training will cover the topics outlined in the Curriculum (above), customized based on the needs and challenges of the scholarship awardees.
